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ORGANISATIONAL PROFILE

1. Introduction:

Action for Social Development (ASD) formerly Assistance for Slum Dwellers (ASD) is a non-government, non-profit and non-political development organization duly registered with Department of Social Service and NGO Affairs Bureau, Government of Bangladesh. ASD was established in the year 1988 by a group of NGO professionals and social workers with the objective to address the basic problems of the slum dwellers of Dhaka City to ensure their positive and due role in the socio-economic development of the country. Gradually ASD extended its development programmes in other cities and remote rural areas with broader objectives.

The problems of slum dwellers are challenging in the context of rapid urbanization. The urban poor live with a high level of insecurity resulting from their lack of land tenancy rights leading to frequent evictions. The other key factors responsible for their sufferings are most impoverished condition of housing and sanitation, high rate of unemployment, highly inadequate supply of safe water, and high incidence of diseases and so on. Though it is not possible to root out all the problems of the urban poor at a time, but their sufferings can be lessened to a bearable extent by undertaking appropriate programmes addressing their basic needs. What ASD intends is to empower slum dwellers especially women, adolescents and children for improving their quality of life through their access to social and institutional resources. To this end ASD has undertaken appropriate programme interventions for its targeted populations.

The vicious cycle of poverty is rotating all over rural Bangladesh due to back sliding of rural economy caused by natural calamities like floods, river erosions, cyclones, etc. Finding no other alternatives and with the expectation of getting a job for livelihood the affected and hapless rural population migrates to urban areas where concentration of economic opportunities is high. To stop such indiscriminate migration they need to be rehabilitated in their own localities with necessary support. ASD is working in rural areas too with that end in view.

2. Vision of ASD

People irrespective of their culture, ethnicity and religion enjoy full democratic and human rights and live in peace and dignity.

3. Mission Statement of ASD:

To facilitate the poor creating solidarity among themselves, building their capacity and bargaining power for realizing their rights and needs in order to improve their quality of life.

5. Structure of ASD:

A 21-member General Body (GB) functions as the highest decision-making organ of **ASD**. An Executive Committee (EC) of 7 members, which is elected for 3-year term sits quarterly to look after the activities of the organization and takes necessary policy decisions. The EC approves annual plans and budget and monitor the activity progress and financial updates. The day-to-day operational responsibility lies with the Executive Director, who as the Chief Executive leads the organization as per policy guidelines and manual approved by the EC and GB. The development programmes of the organization are supervised by a Core Management Team headed by the Executive Director.

6. Financial Management

ASD has a financial manual with generally accepted accounting principles and procedures to maintain a proper and transparent financial management system. The Finance Department headed by a Finance Director with due authority and manpower and equipped with computerized accounting software manages the financial affairs of the organization as per financial manual, government instructions and donors' guidelines.

Branch/project officials are duly authorized to deal with financial affairs of their respective areas under proper supervision and budgetary control of the Head Office. Internal and external audits are conducted on regular intervals. Feedbacks are sent to the relevant sections for making improvements and taking necessary corrective measures.

Monthly/quarterly/semi-annual/annual financial reports are prepared and submitted to the Executive Director for authorization who in turn submits these reports to EC meetings and AGM and concerned Government and Donor agencies and as per their needs. External Audits are done by the Government and Donor approved Audit Firms and submitted to the above agencies as per timeframe.

Sound financial management of ASD is critical to the effective and efficient use of its resources. The funds granted to ASD are entrusted to it by development partners for the use on behalf of beneficiaries/ participants. The ability to provide accurate, complete and timely financial information enables ASD to comply with the rules and regulations of its donors, governments and regulatory agencies. Accurate and timely financial information also assists in decision-making and enhances ASD's ability to attract more funds from its Development Partners.

7. Coordination, Monitoring and Reporting System:

ASD has a structured coordination and monitoring system in place. Participatory monitoring and evaluation are a continuous action-reflection-action process to ensure efficient utilization of scarce resources and valuable time. Feedback from grassroots level is the core process to verify the progress and measure the changes.

ASD central office maintains a system for smooth coordination between central and field offices. Monthly /Quarterly/Semi-annual/Annual Activity and financial reports are prepared and submitted to the Executive Director for authorization who in turn submits these reports to EC meetings and AGM and concerned Government and Donor agencies and as per their needs. External audit and evaluation reports are submitted to the above agencies as per timeframe. Mid-term Participatory Evaluation is done through Participatory Review and Reflection Process (PRRP) to see the impacts at different levels. Independent third-party evaluation is a regular practice of the organization.

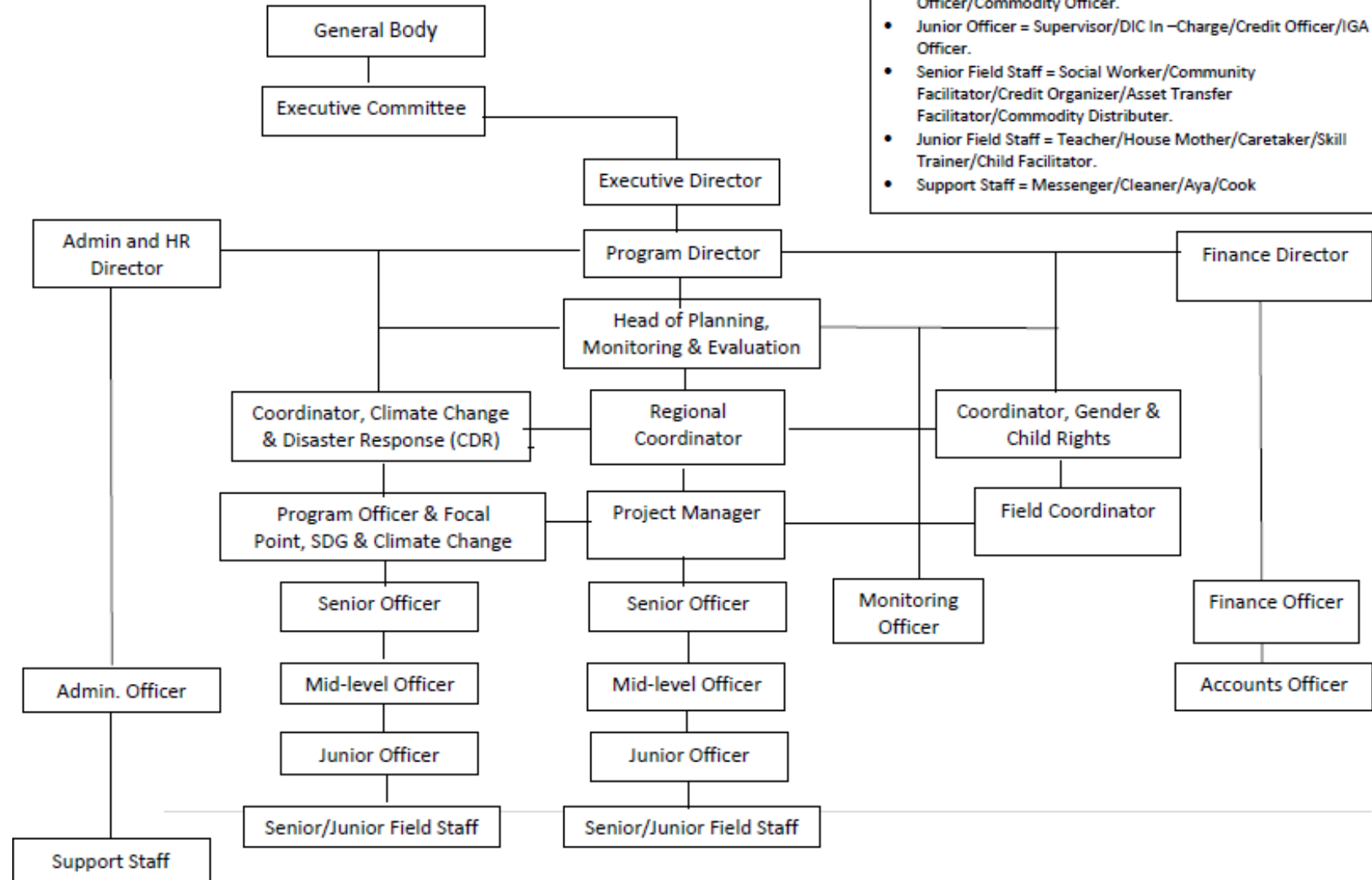
